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## Chief Pilot's Report

In late March, Shane Lockyer established the Calgary Balloon Club Balloon committee to explore the feasibility of the club, again, owning a hot air balloon system for student training, club pilot rentals and potentially, commercial passengers and/or tethers. All current balloon club members were asked to participate, if they were interested.

After several meetings, and a lot of discussion about costing, logistics, and the feasibility, the committee determined that if we had a balloon, these things could happen, but if we don't have a balloon, they are definitely not happening. With that in mind, and in looking at the cost of the equipment required, at the June General meeting, the committee motioned that an amount of \$30,000 be set up in an account for Balloon equipment allocation. The motion also included a provision of proper operating rules and systems in place, to verify to club members that the usage of the equipment would be monitored and assessed.

The committee also realized that the club would have to fundraise for at least double that amount, and that to match this amount, there would have to be some fundraising ideas for the future purchase.

After the motion was passed, the committee advised that the follow up plan was to put together the operating rules, and how the funding was going to be established for the Balloon operations. This would be presented at the September General meeting.

Since June, club member Cliff Skocdopole presented the committee with a proposal of leasing one of his systems to the Calgary Balloon Club for their use. This would provide the club with a procedure that would prove whether or not the equipment would be used and pay for itself. The committee believed that this was definitely a better way to get back into training and using balloon club equipment without a huge outlay of club funds. Cliff would supply all of the equipment, including the full balloon system plus a fan and a trailer. The club would pay Cliff an hourly rate when the Balloon was in use and we would also be responsible to register the equipment and pay for the insurance.

The committee established operating rules that would accommodate the use of this equipment by students, club pilots, and for any commercial passengers or tethers that may be requested.

Club members may have a lot of questions, and/or concerns about what the committee is proposing and we welcome those questions and/or comments, or concerns anytime before or during the September meeting.

The operating rules that the committee put together are as follows, realizing that these are DRAFT only and can be adjusted as we get into full operation.

## Calgary Balloon Club DRAFT Operating Rules JULY 2023

## Introduction

The objective of the Calgary Balloon Club is, where practicably possible, to encourage participation in and awareness of ballooning in Calgary. As part of meeting this objective, the club maintains a hot air balloon. The use of the balloon is intended for light recreational purposes that provide club pilot members the opportunity to build experience in flying, training, and to provide all club members access and opportunity to handle balloon equipment. In order to put some structure to the operations, the following Operating Rules have been established. Decisions to fly the Club balloon should favour safety and prudence. The operating rules are intended to provide direction on the handling of the balloon, events and accounting.

## CALGARY BALLOON CLUB BALLOON OPERATING RULES

1. The Calgary Balloon Club, hereafter referred to as the "Club". Equipment includes all items required to transport or fly the balloon. This includes the basket, envelope, instruments, fan, trailer, and all support equipment relating to the Club hot air balloon(s).
2. The pilot/student pilot must be a contributing, active member in good standing with the Club and will require approval from the Chief Pilot or designate before flying Club equipment.
3. In order to use the equipment, a pilot or student pilot must pay, up front, a refundable, yearly damage deposit $\$ 250$ for students and licensed pilots.
4. The damage deposit $\$ 250$ fee will be waived for a Club member instructor only for the purpose of instructing a Club member/student and only after approval by the Executive and/or Chief Pilot. The instructor must be a Club member in good standing and have an Instructors Rating. The student must be a member of the Club and have paid a refundable, yearly damage deposit of $\$ 250$
5. Booking for daily regular use of the equipment must be obtained from the Flight Coordinator. The regular use is considered as flight training and recreational use ( $80 \%$ of load chart). For any other use of the equipment, approval must be granted by the Executive. Normally, only one flight per category per pilot is to be booked at a time.
6. Following a flight, the equipment is to be returned to its assigned location or the Flight Coordinator advised if returned to a different location.
7. All equipment is to be returned in good operating condition. It is the responsibility of the Pilot to report any deficiencies in the equipment to the Executive and the Flight Coordinator and to initiate and follow up on any repairs as soon as possible (3 days).
8. Operating expenses, and the cost of repairs to Club equipment, (other than normal wear), is the responsibility of the Pilot. The Pilot is responsible for checking and/or maintaining all regulatory requirements (insurance, personal license, operating limits, permits, etc.).
9. Flying Rates are contained in Schedule A of current Operating Rules.
10. Tether Rates are contained in Schedule B of current Operating Rules.
11. Training Rates are contained in Schedule C of current Operating Rules.
12. Any income generated will be forwarded to the Club.
13. A "Flight Account Statement", complete with the flight number, all income and all receipts for claimed expenses shall be submitted to the Treasurer within 30 days. For accounting purposes, first, the hourly fee will be deducted from the income. Second, all or a portion of reasonable expenses, shall be claimed, and after review, paid separately from the remaining income.
14. Prizes (cash or cash value) will be split with the pilot on a $25 / 75$ percent basis in favor of the Club.
15. Prior to flying over a City \&/or carrying Commercial Passengers, a Club Pilot must have 50 PIC minimum untethered hours (experience, insurance considerations) , and be approved by the Chief Pilot or Executive.
16. The Club will work with landowners to maintain reasonable landowner relations
17. Event bookings draft system, requests submitted by January $15^{\text {th }}$ each year.
18. Pilots must be type approved by the chief flight instructor prior to using club equipment flight.
19. Pilots can submit rental booking requests up to 5 flights per year ahead of time by January $15^{\text {th }}$ each year.
20. Student Pilot training will be available by priority on Sundays, bookings will be first come first serve.
21. Any flight can be booked within a 2 week period if available.
22. Any interpretations of, or exceptions to the above operating rules, shall be made by the Club Executive.

The authors went to great detail, and effort in describing the many aspects of ballooning including: crewing, training, and competition. Just when you think that you know all about ballooning, grab a copy, and have a read to fill in your knowledge gaps.

Below, from Chapter 1, CREW DUTIES, are section 1.1 - PREPARATIONS, and Section 1.2 - RIGGING. The crew are important. These sections list many items that a crew person can be considering. There are four more sections to Crew Duties - Launch, Chase, Retrieve, Refuelling. Note that this was written 50 years ago. I like the item that says, carry plenty of film so as not to run out. After decades, the knowledge/wisdom continues to be valuable. Enjoy.

## Chapter 1

## CREW DUTIES

Courtesy

- If you have promised to crew and cannot, advise the pilot immediately so alternate arrangements can be made.


## PREPARATIONS

Contact pilot. Obtain precise information as to:

- Where the launch will take place.
- When you are expected to be there.
- How to find the location.

Check vehicle

- Gas tank full.
- Tires properly inflated. Spare tire ready for use.
- Shovel, sand, and tow rope in the trunk.

Select clothing

- Organic materials are best, such as denim or wool or leather. Synthetic materials can lead to dangerous burns.
- Boots: Balloons land in rough fields and worse. Shoes are generally insufficient for field retrievals.
- Gloves: Protect hands from flame and rope burns.
- Cap: Prevents hair from catching fire.
- Coveralls: Ideal for warmth, pockets for storing tools, body well protected from fire. Best material is Nomex racing driver suits, but expensive!


## Additional items

- Film: Carry plenty. Balloons cause most cameras to run out of film.
- Binoculars: Aid in chase and enjoyment of flight.
- Snacks: Chocolate bars and potato chips dissipate the growlies common to crew who do not have time for breakfast.
- Liquids: Kool-Aid is even more welcome than champagne in summer. Coffee and hot cocoa are priceless in winter.
- Repellent: Insects enjoy tasty crew.
- Maps: Assist you in finding the most convenient roads to use. Why use the gravel roads if you know where the paved ones are?


## RIGGING

## General Rules

- Arrive on time: The flight may have been cancelled or moved to another launch location which you will be unaware of unless you are there to be informed.
- No smoking: Propane may leak unexpectedly.
- Damage (or possible damage) to equipment: Report it immediately whether or not you caused it. Lives depend on it.
- Watch your step: Crew have broken legs falling into gopher holes. Grass can be slippery with morning dew. Cow pies can be embarrassing.
- Be observant: Lives have been saved by crew alerting the pilot to dangerous situations. If something does not look right (even to the inexperienced crew), inform the pilot immediately.
- Know what you are doing: Don't pretend to understand instructions. Ask again...and again, until you know exactly what you must do.
- Practice job rotation: Learn something new each time you crew. The more you know, the more you will be able to help.
- Be courteous: Spectators may be present. Answer their questions. Make new friends for the sport.
- Lift only what you can carry: Ask for extra hands to help you. Don't be a hero with a hernia.


## Propane Tanks

- Don't drop or roll them. Even if external damage is not visible, internal tubing may be broken.
- Check securing straps in the basket are properly attached to the main structure and are not twisted.
- Orientation: Place cylinders so that the service valve is easily connected to fuel systems. Position tanks so that valves will continue to give liquid feed when the basket is tipped horizontally for inflation. Two holes drilled in the valve guard mark down position.
- Note fuel in each tank. Proper weight can be recognized with experience. Empty or partly empty tanks may be accidentally put in a basket. Check.
- Connect fuel system. POL connections have a reverse thread, rotate counter-clockwise to attach, clockwise to detach.
- Screw in fittings by hand. Rotate tank to bring fittings in line. Avoid use of wrench until connections are threaded fully. Possibility of "cross threading" if fittings are not properly engaged.
- Wrenches: Always use properly sized wrench. Never use "monkey wrench". This slips and will "round off" corners of a brass nut. Always gently tighten fittings with a wrench. Torque just slightly more than hand tight.
- Tank straps: Know how belt fastening mechanism works. Some must be continually under tension when being secured, or they will slip. Test security of belts by pulling on tank to simulate landing forces.


## Basket

- Structure: No parts cracked, loose or damaged.
- Position: Align basket with envelope via a reference mark which will indicate which side the instrumentation cables are placed.
- Anchorage: To prevent dragging during inflation, a line may be secured to the basket carrying handles or structure. Use round-turn and two half-hitches at anchorage point and slip knot at basket.


## Envelope

- Establish downwind directions by means of lighter flame, wet finger, morning mist drift or cigarette smoke (no smoking after this).
- Unpack balloon in a line heading downwind from basket. Check the field for sharp objects which may damage the balloon and remove them.
- Envelope storage bag: Fold neatly and place in basket.
- Centre panel or gore: Locate reference maker showing which is the envelope's centre and spread out fabric on both sides. Balloon may have to be rolled over so make sure the manoeuvring vent is on the bottom of the balloon during inflation. Otherwise, excessive air leakage can occur and inflation can be difficult.
- Avoid stepping on fabric. Treat as if tissue paper.
- Floor tension: The bottom of the envelope becomes the floor which should be taut. Go along the side of the balloon with a partner on the opposite side. Pull fabric from underneath until tension is felt by the partner.
- Rips or other damage: Report immediately any size of hole.
- Suspension cables: Straighten and untwist cables. Attach to the basket in the proper sequence.
- $\quad$ Shackles should be done up hand tight. Pocket wrench may be used to snug up. Safety lock any karabiners involved.
- Check the sequence of attachment by observing the cables are attached in the same order as they are on the balloon envelope mouth.


## Inflation Fan

- Gas: Sufficient for inflation.
- Oil: Level sufficient
- Fan Guard: Not loose. Fan must not rub on guard.
- Safety: Crew wearing dangling scarves, cameras or laces should not work near fan. Items may become entangled in rotating parts.

Fan Check:
i.point away from balloon
ii.turn fuel switch on
iii.turn on spark plug arrestor switch
iv.open choke
v.pull starter cord
vi.if motor flooded, close choke and pull starter cord until motor fires
vii.observe if parts or belts need tightening when running
viii.shut off fan by turning all switches off
ix.position to one side of basket and point into mouth of balloon

## Instrumentation

- Secure instrument panel to basket.
- Calibrate altimeter, variometer and temperature gauge. Check temperature gauge cable is intact and plugged in.


## Miscellaneous

- Fire extinguisher: Pressure adequate. Position where all crew know where it is ready for use.
- Champagne: Pad and store in basket.
- Dropline/Trail rope: Not tangled, free to run.

A little over a year ago, we participated in the first annual Rise Up Balloon Festival, in Medicine Hat, Alberta. While attending this fun event we were taken on a city tour and part of the tour was to visit the World's Largest Teepee.

The Saamis Teepee, located along the Trans Canada Highway, was constructed for the 1988 Winter Olympics that were held in Calgary, Alberta. Each of the 10 masts has a large storyboard on it, which shows parts of the Indigenous culture and history. The main masts of the teepee are 215 feet tall (the same as a 20 story building) and the diameter of the Teepee is 160 feet with a foundation weight of 800 metric tons. Community groups can apply to have the city light up the teepee in various different colours to represent community groups or support programs. That week it was coincidentally lit up green in support of a local program "Our Collective Journey", which assists with mental health and addiction recovery and this group works in collaboration with the Rise Up Balloon Festival (a perfect partnership) to bring awareness to these issues.

If you know balloonists, you know they're always looking for some way to change things up or take on a challenge. So within a few minutes of being there, Cliff started looking at the size of the Teepee and the conversation started, "Do you think we could fit "Northern FLights" inside of this?"

Our Kubicek BB26XR balloon "Northern FLights" has a photo I took of the Aurora dancing in the sky over Cliff's (pilot and my husband) grandparents' farm. The vent has a second photo on it that I took of a full moon.

We approached the organizers of the Rise Up event, Willy and Cindy Taillon, and that got the ball rolling. Of course we needed permission from the city and the blessing of the Indigenous community whose cultural beliefs are that the Northern Lights are the spirits of their ancestors dancing across the sky.

One year later, the week before the 2nd annual Rise Up event, we received the news from Willy and Cindy that the City of Medicine Hat had granted permission and the Indigenous community had given us their blessing! We were also told that the burner of the balloon could be representative of the home fire in the Teepee. All we needed now was for the weather to cooperate so that we could actually pull this thing off.

On Thursday, May 25 we were unable to fly our evening flight due to fast upper winds, but as we drove back to our hotel, close to dusk, we noticed the winds were dying off, and the flags in the area were hanging, so we decided to head over to the Teepee, to check conditions there. Thumbs up...conditions were perfect!

Our crew was ready and the rest of the ballooning community that was attending the event headed over to assist and observe. As the sun set and we inflated "Northern FLights", there were doubts as to whether she was going to fit in the opening.


As they moved her into position with extra crown lines for stability, it was a perfect fit! There was even one lucky young lady who was having her grad photos taken at the teepee who got, in my mind, the most epic grad photo ever with the balloon as well!

It was truly an honour to be able to place our balloon inside the Teepee and we would like to thank all those involved in it, including the city of Medicine Hat, the local Indigenous community, Rise Up Balloon Festival (Willy and Cindy!), the Calgary Balloon Club, our Hespero Hot Air team crew (you are the best) and everyone else who helped in any way. This was a highlight for us for sure and I'm not sure how we will top it...but I'm sure we will think of something!

The flying events will take place at or near the Hespero Airport. For pilots, it is listed in the Canadian Flight Supplement under "Hespero". This is not a busy runway and is privately owned so we have our freedom to come and go as we please.

Propane will be for sale at the Hespero airport at wholesale prices.


We have six flights planned, weather permitting. The schedule of events (see schedule) will consist of some fun flights, perhaps a competition flight (Hare and Hound), a timed long/short jump, a crew competition, and some fun socialising. The details of the competition flight will be handed out at the briefing.


There will be trophies, prizes, and a chance to win the propane you used during the weekend event. If you want to have ownership of that great Hespero trophy all it takes is a $\$ 20.00$ pilot entry fee and winning the competition for entering long/short jump, winner takes all money and bragging rights!


There are also weekend events like farmers markets on Friday and Saturday at nearby towns. As part of history on the September long weekend we will be having the long time "Rolling Hills Corn Roast" on Saturday evening. Come and check out our Corn Roaster!

## ACCOMMODATIONS
