
Jenn Podruski: Vice President

Club Balloon and Operating Rules:

Since our last newsletter in November, the renewed Calgary Balloon Club balloon program is well on the way.

We have two Club approved pilots and instructors, Shane Lockyer and Jenn Podruski and one Club approved Student Pilot, Karl Schultz. Karl has completed 2 training flights with Shane and we have had interest from a couple of future student pilots that will carry our program well into the future. We are expecting a few more club approved pilots and instructors as well. Club pilots interested in instructing or flying the club balloon can contact me and I will forward them the Application. Future Student Pilots can also contact me to receive the data and application for student


training on the club balloon.



the Balloon Committee has also completed their work on the full Operating Rules for the benefit of club approved pilots and interested club passengers and crew. These Operating Rules are awaiting Executive approval before presenting them to the Membership at a General Meeting or in the next newsletter.

Prohibited Zones (PZs):

Pilots are often discussing how to handle the current Prohibited Zones (PZ) around our flying areas. Thanks to Dirk, we all have access to a current PZ map but as we all know, the more that you fly in an area, the more that the PZs tend to increase.



We have certainly seen this in the High River area. Whether a PZ is still a PZ or would the landowner benefit from having a follow up meeting with a Balloon Landowner Liaison Committee are topics of conversation whenever PZs are being discussed. The Executive is considering using this as a topic of conversation for sessions to be held at one or more of the club meetings in lieu of a speaker. Information from pilots, crews, and our more rural members would be greatly appreciated to come forth with some constructive ideas on the handling of Prohibited Zones.

AAIR:

A reminder to pilot owners that Transport Canada has resumed the requirement to complete the Annual Airworthiness Information Report (AAIR) for their balloon(s). Last year, the reporting requirements were temporarily suspended and with the requirement for a new submission, owners must include data for 2022 and 2023.




Is This Exciting or What??

On this group, we will include activities as they happen, promotions for upcoming events, meetings and allow for feedback and discussion from our members. Current members will be invited to join via email so that, if you do not currently utilize Facebook but would like to join, you can be a part of this Group,



"Still Standing" in High River

What sort of ballooning happens at 10:00 a.m. on a hot, sunny July morning, when thermals are picking up and sensible balloonists are relaxing in the shade? How about a 40-minute static display in front of a camera crew for a TV show? If you watch "Still Standing," a CBC-TV show about small towns, you'll see just that. The show filmed an episode in High River, and it was fascinating to have a behind-the-scenes perspective about how they bring the show to life.

The show first aired on November 7th, but the work began the preceding June, when CBC story producer Camille Lawrence spent a week in High River interviewing locals to discover the stories most suitable for a TV show. She interviewed Jamie Kinghorn, who also showed her around town. I met with her at the Balloon Port one day after school, to show her how a balloon and mini balloon work.

Camille returned to High River on the morning of July 31st, along with a production team. By the time their trucks full of equipment started rolling into the port, we were all decked out in Ra hats and shirts, had set up snacks on the picnic tables, pulled Ra's basket out of the trailer, positioned trucks for the tether, and had the mini balloon standing by in case it was too windy for a full size balloon.

We started the actual filming with a cold inflation, during which one of the camera operators went inside the envelope. After Jamie hot inflated the balloon, he had Brent Gordon and I get into the basket and crouch down to add dead weight, as a precaution against the thermals that were starting to dance across the field. Ahh, the glamorous life of a balloon pilot, to crouch down in the bottom of a basket, not sure where to turn one's face when others are *still standing*.

Jonny Harris then approached the basket, and climbed in. Jamie gave him a quick briefing about what to expect, then took the balloon up to about 30' before ducking down into the basket himself so the film crew could get footage of Jonny saying, "This is High River, Alberta!" We repeated it several times, because Jonny seemed rather nervous at first. Maybe having three giggling pilots crouched down in the bottom of the basket making comments like, "Bend your knees! We're coming down!" didn't help. Ironically, that first scene is the one that is shown at the end of the show.

After filming the initial meeting, Jamie put me on the controls, with clear instructions not to pull out the top, no matter how gusty it got, then went with Jonny to the north end of the field for what they had said would be a 20-minute interview. To help steady the balloon against the sudden wind gusts, Ken Dudgeon stayed on the crownline, and lots of great crew held onto that basket - Brent, Stacey, Ella and Breeley Jensen; Linda Tolman, Brenda Norrie, and Scott Beaton. It's a good thing we had so many crew - the 20-minute interview turned into 45 minutes of standing in a swaying basket, looking up into a swaying envelope each time I hit the burner.

The film crew carefully positioned a champagne bottle on the interview table to try to hide the crowd of people hanging onto that basket. The TV crew also asked if the noisy burner could be turned off during the filming. Jamie replied that it would work if they wanted footage of the balloon's envelope coming down.

The interview eventually concluded, and Jamie suggested that Jonny pull out Ra's top. He cautiously climbed back into the basket, where I explained how to put a big hole in the top of Jamie's balloon. Jonny pulled the vent line and Ra gracefully settled to the ground.

After a few more shots where the team all gathered in the basket to say, "Congratulations on 100 episodes!" the equipment was packed up and put away, but the work continued for the Still Standing team. They met with several other people in and around town to record more stories.



On Thursday, August 3rd, a live comedy show was held in downtown High River, during which several comedians warmed up the audience before Jonny took the stage. He expertly wove together stories about High River, including the story of the Heritage Inn International Balloon Festival.

Months later, Camille emailed to say that the show would be airing on November 7th. We were all wondering how it would look on T.V., and gathered at the Heritage Inn's lounge to watch it together. They did an amazing job weaving the stories together, and it was great to see all the familiar faces being featured, and in the audience.

Take Your Aviation Skills to the Next Level

"You can have 100 hours, or you can have the same hour 100 times over!"

A Good Tip for Aeronauts, Student Pilots and Private Pilots and it's a good reminder for us all regardless of what level we're at with our aviation experience.

- Enrolling in online courses is a great way to refresh your aviation knowledge in areas such as meteorology, radio communications, navigation, etc.
- There are several podcasts on weather that you can listen to while driving to and from work or on those long road trips to the next balloon event.
- The Hangaaar Private Pilot course is a great way to get current.
 I'm subscribed with them and get weekly e-mails on various topics. This one on taking your "aviation skills to the next level" I found interesting and motivates you to want to learn more on various topics.
- Look for a Flight Instructor you can work well with.
- Try and do some flying that's interesting.

- Contour flying or fast descents & ascents. A good skill set to have when
 you want to speed up your flight in low winds and get across a field so you
 can get to your target or landing spot in half the amount of time instead of
 just cruising along at 2 knots. Boooorrring!
- Find someone with a similar background to go flying with.
- Flying is more fun when you get good at it.
- Consider getting different ratings such as Night Rating, AME License or certification in various meteorology courses.
- Cloud formations are a good skill set to have. Each cloud tells a story. Knowing what you're looking at can help you with predicting what's coming your way and deciding if it's safe to fly. Is that weather system far enough away for you to complete your flight and land safely before it reaches your location?

- Brush up on **Thermals**.
 - Thermals are usually short-lived phenomena and dissipate after a brief period of time. When faced with a thermal an Aeronaut should not vent in an effort to descend and land, instead "altitude is your friend."
 - If you keep the balloon at flight temperature, the thermal usually "spits" the balloon out at a higher altitude. When this happens, the balloon can again be controlled and a safe landing may be executed.
- Always keep your envelope pressurized! Continue to fly the balloon.
 Many Aeronauts are distracted by the thermal flight experience and may
 forget that the balloon is cooling at a faster than normal rate so ensure that
 the temp of the envelope is kept at or above that is required to maintain
 normal flight. Under NO circumstance should you allow the balloon to cool.
 The temperature noted at equilibrium should be a minimum temperature to
 maintain.
- If it's related to Aviation, any new knowledge will benefit your skill set and refresh old knowledge regularly to keep your skills proficient.
- Being prepared is the best way to have a successful & safe flight every single time.
- Meteorology knowledge will assist you in the Go or No Go decision.
 Weather is fluid & constantly changing.

The more you know, the better prepared you'll be.

A HAIRY EXPERIENCE

It seems that safety items relating to balloon flights are continually being experienced with a lesson to be learned from each encounter. Some turn out to be quite bizarre. This was the case with one of my recent flights when something happened unexpectedly and taught me yet another lesson.

It is a common practice of mine to always brief the passengers at some time during the flight on the preparation for landing. If I anticipate a fast landing, emphasis is placed on the need to stow away loose articles, cameras, binoculars, handbags, etc. Also, the need to take up the correct position prior to landing and to remain in the basket until the word is given to exit.

On this particular day a thorough briefing had been given as a very fast landing was anticipated.

One of my lady passengers was lying on the downside of the basket during the drag landing and her long hair became wedged between the rim of the basket and the ground. Fortunately, the basket came to a stop before any injuries occurred with only some slight discomfort to the passenger.

Under these circumstances, she could have quite easily suffered severe injuries to her scalp, and worse yet ended up with an injured or broken neck. I had never given thought to such a thing happening.

So, girls and <u>fellows</u>, if you are so endowed with long hair, I would suggest you tuck away that long hair under your jacket, blouse, shirt or wherever, before landing.

I would suggest that pilots include in their briefing prior to landing a warning for those with unusually long hair to stow it away safely along with the other items.


